

At the July meeting we had the company of Graham Wiles, Project Manages for the Green Business Network which is a non profit making organisation which managers The Able Project, a community based fish farming scheme providing transitional and training for disadvantaged young people.

Graham very eloquently, and very movingly, spoke for an hour to the members present on his vision that our Club would become involved in a small way with the provision of one to one tuition and encouragement to disadvantaged youngsters who are not academically inclined but quite interested and gifted in artistic projects. His hope was that a number of our members could put to one side an hour or two per week to assist voluntary and professional carers, initially in the Wakefield area, to pass along the skills of woodcarving and other related subjects like art and woodwork.

A Criminal Records Bureau (CRB) check will be required of any member who wishes to be involved but we were assured that the cost will be met by the Green Business Network. We were also assured that no member will be left unsupervised with a young person taking tuition and that grants are available for the supply of any specialist equipment required and members' out of pocket expenses will be reimbursed.

Initially the meetings will take place on the 34 acre woodland site in the Wakefield area where suitable accommodation is available but Graham advised us that further developments are progressing on a 10 acre site at Heckmondwike and a further site in Todmorden.

It was clearly pointed out by Graham, and endorsed by some of our own members with past experience in this area of education, that getting involved with disadvantaged youngsters is not an easy undertaking but if successful can be extremely rewarding to both parties.

When Graham departed there was little chance to fully discuss his proposals, therefore, it was decided that members should have the opportunity to read the enclosed document relating to The Able Trust, have time to think about their own commitments and time schedules and that names would be taken at the August meeting of any member who would like to learn more about this project. (If you can't get to the meeting and are interested please give me a call on 01422-361109.)

Members who put their names forward will be invited to take up the offer to visit the Wakefield site for an official visit and discussions as to the next step forward.

Without a doubt if, as a Club, we can offer assistance to less fortunate individuals than ourselves it will be a very interesting undertaking with immense personal and collective rewards. However, we shouldn't underestimate the difficulties involved but we are all reasonably sensible adults with a wealth of work and lifetime skills that we can put to good use.



For the July meeting we had a "Free and Easy".



teered to donate the prize, forgot to bring it!!!!




















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Future meetings:

9th August 2008: We have a return visit of **Brian Chapman** who last spoke to the Club in May 2004. On his last visit Brian talked in detail about the Geisler-Moroder Austrian Woodcarving School. The courses cover 9 days of intensive carving, 2 days' painting and staining in the Tyrolean way and a visit to various interesting places in the beautiful Lech Valley. The school is 5 hours' from Munich and is priced at approximately £600.00 for the course, excluding transport.
