David is the editor of the Stickmaker Magazine and we are indebted to George Crawshaw for introducing him to the Club.



## Royal Armouries Museum Panels up-date.

Having sat at home watching the very moving ceremony of Remembrance at the Cenotaph in London it made me aware of how very honoured we are to be playing a small, but extremely demanding, part in the commemoration of the service personnel and civilians who gave their lives in both the 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> World Wars. The project we are embarked on will be a lasting celebration of the talent within our Club and a marvellous memorial to the fallen.

After the last Sub-Group meeting on the 15<sup>th</sup> October it became quite obvious that the presentation date for the hand over is more likely to be towards the end of 2010 than the middle of the year. We have 95 individual carvings to complete by 51 carvers plus the actual construction of the two Panels, which in total is a mammoth, but a worthwhile and exciting, undertaking.

Although nothing has been decided yet, and will be put to the total club membership for approval, it was thought that an ideal time for the eventual hand over could be the 11<sup>th</sup> November to coincide with Remembrance Day and the many activities arranged at this time of year at the Royal Armouries. This would give us the extra time we are likely to need and make the handover ceremony more meaningful.

Progress is going to plan with all carvers now being in possession of timber and the necessary drawings and as I write at least five people, to my knowledge, have completed their first carving and are now preparing to start a second. The Utile timber for the frame has been purchased and collected by Derek Adams and Bryan Hodgson and is being stored by Derek until required. Our budget price was £325 and the actual cost finished up at £253.

Graham Lockwood, who is extremely accomplished in photography and taught computer-aided design, has kindly taken on the task of photographing both the finished and work in progress carvings. He has also offered his expertise with the technicalities of the overall booklet design. Frank, who usually takes on the responsibility of club photographs, is fully in agreement with Graham undertaking this task and will assist him where necessary.

After Christmas we shall start in earnest gathering together information for the booklet and putting together ideas for the overall design and content of the booklet. If anybody has any additional information regarding the particular subject they are carving please forward to Anne or myself. I have been in touch with the Armouries who are actively seeking information on the type and availability of dispensing machines. The machine will eventually determine the size of the booklet and will be located in near proximity to the Panels.

A meeting has been arranged with Celia Kilner for the 9<sup>th</sup> December to discuss the content, design and costing of the glass information plate. Meeting with Celia will be Mike Hadfield, Bryan Hodgson, Dennis Farmer and myself.

It has been suggested that after the classes at Brooksbank and All Saints finish in late March 2010, that classes could be extended at either one or both venues to assist with tuition throughout the summer for the carvers still working on the Panels. I'm not sure when Des Lindley's class finishes or if it goes on throughout the summer months.

The January 9th 2010 monthly Shepley meeting has been designated as a "Free and Easy" with the emphasis on updating all members on the Royal Armouries Panels' progress.

Dr Riley and Steve Burt, Directors of the Royal Armouries Museum, have been contacted with a suggestion that they accept an invitation to our February 13<sup>th</sup> 2010 Shepley monthly meeting. The reason for the invitation would be two fold. It will give Dr Riley, Steve Burt and others the opportunity to meet the wider membership of our Club and view the carvings that are finished and in progress. Secondly the suggestion would be that they give a short talk on their plans for the two Panels and the history, functions and extended venues connected with the Royal Armouries.

Evening social/progress meetings at The Fleece, Elland: The first meeting has been arranged for Thursday the 26<sup>th</sup> November 2009 commencing at 7:00pm (to ensure all carvings can be viewed and photographed in the time available). Constructive advice, if required, will be available. Our negotiations with Lindley Liberal Club for a room unfortunately didn't come to a positive conclusion but the landlady and her staff at the Fleece are very welcoming. Please note this is as much a social evening as a progress evening and wives, partners etc are very welcome. Because of members' Christmas commitments we shall not hold a further meeting until January. (I will try and put a direction map to the Fleece Inn in the latest Newsletter pack).

Will all members please ensure they keep a record of how many hours they employ in carving time. This is important for the booklet and publicity as we all know the first question anybody asks is "how long did it take".

Reg Platt has asked me to pass on the information that the gentelman who runs The Old 7th Batt HQ, DW Regiment West Riding TA. Bullecourt Museum, The old Drill Hall, Scar Lane, Rufford Road, Milnsbridge, Huddersfield is very interested in our project and very helpful with military information. Open times are 2:00pm to 4:00pm Saturday and Sunday.

I had cause to contact the Publications and Information Supervisor at the Commonwealth War Graves Commission regarding some information I needed to assist with the carving I am trying to do of a stonemason carving a gravestone. Having explained why I wanted the information we had a long conversation which resulted in a request that we keep the Commonwealth Graves Commission informed of our progress. She has also asked, when available, for photographs and a copy of the booklet for their records.
