June 11th: Patrick McLaughlin from Heritage Inspired:

Our thanks to Patrick for a very interesting talk on the history of the Green Man. He explained that a search of many churches and cathedrals will often lead you to discover, somewhere, a carving of a human head within a mass of leaves. Sometimes, the leaves appear to grow out of the head itself; at other times the human head seems to be a chance result of the configuration of the leaves. It seems to be a recurring theme amongst the many grotesque figures adorning many churches and is commonly used as a decorative architectural ornament. Green Men are most frequently found on carvings in churches and other buildings both secular and ecclesiastical.

People, after the meeting, were asking where Patrick came from and what Heritage Inspired actually did. From what I gathered, from talking to Patrick, Heritage Inspired is a South Yorkshire faith tourism organisation that gives heritage talks to all local groups across

South Yorkshire. The talks are on: Churches and other faith sites in SY; Abbeys and Castles in SY; and, Symbolism in SY. They are now starting to branch out into West Yorkshire and I believe we are one of the first groups in this area that they have visited. They are predominantly funded by the National Lottery and the donations of groups who use their services. We gave a £50 donation.

Patrick does quite a number of talks on things like Abbeys, Castles, Cathedrals, Great Houses and Halls and local history.

<u>July 9th Russell Birch:</u> (who is a professional singer under the name of Russell Elliott and, therefore, gets me all confused whenever I contact him):

You may remember that Russell had an article in the same March/April edition of the Woodcarving magazine that featured the Armouries panels. His article was on carving miniature mussels on buffalo horn. All of Russell's carvings are very, very small so David will have to be on his toes with the video camera.

I understand that Russell, who was booked to come along last year but got the dates mixed up, will be taking us through the process and tools he uses to create his miniature marvels. Told him, if he runs out of material, he can always give us a song.

Skelmanthorpe Methodist Church: On Monday 6th June, David Hey, Graham Lockwood, Mike Chambers and myself gave a talk on the Royal Armouries panels to about 40 + ladies and gentlemen of the above church.

The meeting started with a hymn and a prayer, we weren't very good at that, and finished with tea, coffee and biscuits plus a cheque for £25 which the 'boys' donated to our club. We also managed to sell £72 worth of booklets. (We are now out of booklets and I'm trying to get some back from the Armouries, no reply!!)

We have been asked, by Albert, to give a further talk to the Holmfirth Rotary Club in November.

Royal Armouries: Things are starting to move, at last, and the electrician is working on putting in spot lights to illuminate the two panels and the glass information sheet.

By coincidence both Mike Hadfield and myself visited the Armouries on Monday 6th June. Mike arrived before me and managed to speak to the electrician but no work had started. When I arrived marks had been drawn onto the ceiling indicating where the lights were being fitted. We are a little concerned that these are further away from the panels than we personally would have mounted them but have been assured they will be OK.

I have asked, again, about some information being put around the panels and suggested that our club would be willing to consider taking on the task, and cost, (as suggested at the AGM) of blowing up the article from the Woodcarving magazine and having it framed. No reply!!!!

You can just see the line on the roof, slightly to the left

of the circular lights, and that a light has been fitted over the glass sheet. We would have put the light right above the glass shining down the back. This light that has been fitted, unfortunately, creates a lot of shadows.







Regretfully, I have to report that <u>Graeme Richardson</u>, yet another long serving member of the club, has sadly passed away.
