Meeting at Shepley Saturday 8th October: I understand from everybody who attended, 34 in total, that we must say a big thank you to Mike Chambers and Bryan Hodgson for taking on the demonstration side of the morning which concentrated on all the aspects of chisel sharpening, a science that eludes the majority of us.

Mike demonstrated the Tormek type wet stone method and the Ashley Isles diamond impregnated rubber wheel and mop system, which I think the majority of people use - although what do I know? Bryan again rolled out his top secret home invented, designed and manufactured sharpening system, last seen 6 years ago, that one day he is hoping to make his fortune with and then jet off to his private island in the Caribbean to finish his days carving coconut trees. A great big thanks to both of them.

Meeting Shepley Saturday November 12th: This is planned as a full day event with our good friend Peter Berry. A pea and pie lunch will be served and we are asking, as usual, for all members to bring something along for the sweet course. A fee of £5 will be charged at the door to cover Peter's costs and the lunch. An extra £1 will be charged to those who are carving to cover half of the cost of the wood blank that Peter will provide, the club is picking up the extra cost.

Peter is going to set up at the front of the room with a camera on his work area and, as he goes through the stages of carving one of his many character carvings, members will be encouraged to follow his progress with their own block of timber. Peter is going to provide each carver with a band sawn blank of Lime or Jelutong. This blank will have an inch or so stub at the bottom that can be held in a workmate, or better still, in one of the small swivel carving clamps if you have one. Talking to Peter the other day, he said that the tools required are ideally the Flexcut type chisels, or smaller gouges, and a knife would also be handy. His intention is to go as slowly as necessary, but will encourage the more experienced carvers to add their own embellishments into the carving. I understand that the cut out will have arms away from the body that will encourage more advanced carving. So at the end of the day, everybody should walk away with a finished carving - we hope!

We shall try and cover the whole floor with some large dust sheets to make it easier for clearing up and everybody is asked to bring along a Workmate. If any carvers don't have a Workmate would they please ring either myself, 01422-361109 or Adrian 01484-861452 and we shall have a word with Mike or Malcolm and try to borrow a few from the Birchencliffe carving classes.



This is a new project for the club and everybody is encouraged to join in and make it an enjoyable day. At the last meeting about 20 people present raised their hands to indicate that they would be participating. However, I'm fairly sure we shall have a lot more than that as very nearly everybody in the Brooksbank class, and I understand most of the Wakefield and Birchencliffe carvers, has indicated that they intend to take part.
