## Shepley meeting:

March 10th: Mike Disley will again try to give his talk on his life as a stonecarver.

April 14th: This is the club's Annual General Meeting. The last few meetings have gone through quite quickly and the plan is to give the children's hospice sub-group the chance to share their thoughts, and gather support and approval, for the new panel.

May 12th: I was given the name of a stick maker by Malcolm Cooper with a suggestion that the gentleman would give an interesting talk to our Saturday meeting. Just as I picked the phone up to ring him it occurred to me that the best stick maker many of us have ever come across is in fact, Malcolm Cooper, our own member. So after a few words with Malcolm, and a little gentle persuasion, Malcolm volunteered to take on the talk for the May meeting and enlighten us on the remarkable talent that produces some amazing work.

June 16th: The return of Michael Painter but this time, as requested by quite a number of members, we shall make this full day meeting into a practical woodcarving workshop. Michael will lead the group through the carving of an item yet to be decided on, possibly a face, hand or foot carving. Note this is the 16th not the second Saturday as Michael teaches on the second Saturday of each month.

July 14th: A new face to the club will be Mark Raby who is a wood finishing demonstrator. He will concentrate on various finishings for different types of carvings. Mark is also the demonstrator/agent for Jo Sonja products and I understand that there may be a chance that Jo will be accompanying him. August 11th and October 13th: to be advised.

September 8th: This month it is our turn to host the joint meeting with the Lancashire & Cheshire Carvers at Shepley. We have not tried to plan the day yet as a suggestion has been made to the Lancashire club that they join us for our meeting in November. They have a very heavy schedule of display work in September and it may be to their, and our advantage, that they join our workshop with Peter Berry.

November 10th: The return of Peter Berry for a full day for a similar workshop to that held last November.

December 8th: Christmas Luncheon. Following discussions at our last meeting the Meltham Golf Club has been booked for his year's event. We appreciate that the room is not totally ideal, although we managed alright for quite a number of years, but the food should be a vast improvement on last years event.

**Royal Armouries panels:** Nice to report that at last we have a number of information boards around the panels and, to be fair to the Armouries, they have done a really nice job. The main one - see photo left below - is located at the side of the glass panel and they have taken the wording from the article we had in the Woodcarving magazine, but of course compressed it down to just the important details.

On the barrier they have included three more upstanding display stands, similar in size to the progressive carvings that Darrel did, and two of these show the diagram of each panel and the other refers to the sale of the booklets in the bookshop - see bottom photograph.



You will notice that there are some dreadful shadows on the panels and these are caused by a couple of the flood lights in the ceiling not working. I have emailed our contact at the Armouries thanking them for putting up the display material and asked if they would kindly get their electrician onto the light problem.

They have also been asked to inform us about the current situation regarding any money raised from the sale of booklets. We need to know what the situation is for when our accounts are presented at the April AGM. To their credit the booklets are now clearly displayed on the cash out counter in the bookshop.

The display is now quite good, perhaps just lacking the video we ran at the Halifax Town Hall and Huddersfield Parish church, but the disadvantage of its location is that unless you go to the third floor by lift there is a danger you could miss them altogether. It possibly needs some reference to the panels location displayed on the ground floor - something we will try to work on with our contacts at the Armouries.

**Forget-me-Not Trust:** This project is progressing at some speed and the people involved in collecting, sorting, sizing, re-drawing and copying are doing a great job.

Our grant application is now being processed by the Community Foundation of Calderdale, but it will be a few weeks before we know the eventual outcome.

One disappointment is correspondence from both Disney Enterprises Inc. and Warner Brothers (Harry Potter and Co) stating that, because of copyright, we have been refused permission to use any of their characters. We are in the process of writing back stating our case more clearly and arguing that we are not a commercial organisation using the images for personal profit. I think this could be a long drawn out fight.

The next Management Meeting is on Thursday the 5th April 2012 at 7:30pm at the Round Hill pub. The next Forget-me-Not meeting is on the 8th March at 9:30am at the hospice.
