Our grateful thanks to Mike who gave a very confident, relaxed but very interesting talk of his life and times in stonecarving.

Mike did a Fine Arts course at Sunderland Art College in stone carving and then continued learning his craft on the cathedrals and churches of Northern England. Throughout his working life he has worked in stone quarries both in this country and in Zimbabwe, where he worked alongside the legendary Shona carvers, and for a while in Japan.

For the last ten years Mike has worked on many commissions for a wide

variety of clients, from building firms to schools, from hospitals to city centres. Mike has also taught many workshops for children and adults across Britain and Ireland. To date he has produced over seventy pieces, each distinguished by his unique stile of carving.

The stonecarvers are having an open day on Saturday 28th April from 10:00am to 6:00pm at their premises in Halifax. They have extended an invitation to all our members.

The entrance will be free and there are demonstrations, exhibits and a chance to have a go at stonecarving under guidance from members - as if we needed guidance!

You find them by going down Simmons Lane, opposite the Shay Football Ground. You then follow the brown signs to the Shears Inn and park beneath the mill chimney half way down. Their workshops are on the ground floor of Shaw Lodge Mill. You cant miss it once you have parked. Well worth a visit if you have the time and they are a nice friendly lot.

Carving classes:

Although we were grateful for the offer of premises at Birchencliffe, when we were asked to leave All Saints over the CRB fiasco, we are all aware that the premises now used for day classes are not ideal. The lighting is poor, its sometimes cold in the dead of winter and having to work off workmates is nowhere near as convenient as proper purpose built woodworking benches.

I recently informed Mike (I didn't bother Malcolm as he has enough on his plate at the moment) that when I recently booked six extra Monday nights at Brooksbank I had a word with Jane Blackburn, who is our contact at Brooksbank for booking the room, and asked if it was possibly to hire the room we use on Monday evenings for a couple of hours during the day. Regretfully, she came back and said that although they would be delighted to have us they couldn't find a two hour period during school hours when the room was not in use. She did say we could have the room we use any day from 4:30pm if that helped.

Inevitably the question of CRB checks came up and she clarified the following point. Jane thought that if a person attends a school for the sole purpose of education, and that can be craft related, that person does <u>not</u> require a CRB check. Any person teaching, or volunteering, and having direct contact with children, or vulnerable adults, <u>does</u> need a CRB check. I rang the CRB help desk and they confirmed this was correct. Frank Greenwood also checked on the internet and downloaded a whole string of documents that again supports this statement. It would appear that the rules have been relaxed.

Mike has suggested that I write, on behalf of the club, to All Saints School to see if there is a chance of regaining our old woodworking room. This I will do and report back as soon as I have any information.
