David McDonald—The Royal Yacht Britannia

Life on board the Royal Yacht

Local man David McDonald told of his life as a radio operator on the Royal Yacht Britannia that was the sea going home of the Queen and the Royal Family for more than forty years. David was a radio operator and the resident DJ for three years in the early 1960s.

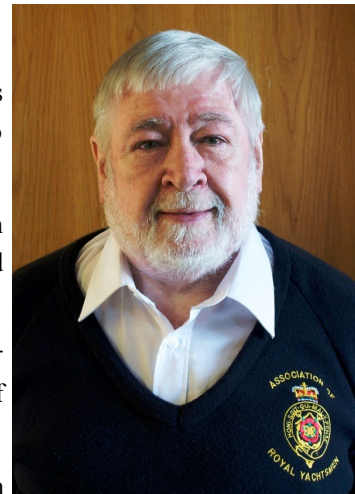
David told of his pride in being a member of the Association of Royal Yachtsmen who still visit Leith on a regular basis to assist with the up-keep of this beautiful vessel. The Britannia is now berthed and serving as a visitor attraction in Leith.

Britannia was the only ship in the world whose Captain traditionally was an Admiral. Nowhere on her side will you see her name, yet she is recognised around the world. She was built for the dual role of becoming a hospital ship if needed.

David told how the Britannia was launched from the John Brown & Company shipyard in Clydebank on 16 April, 1953. For over 44 years she served the Royal Family, travelling over one million miles to become the most famous ship in the world. To Her Majesty The Queen, Britannia proved to be the perfect royal residence for glittering state visits, official receptions, royal honeymoons and relaxing family holidays. For Great Britain, she was a majestic symbol of the Commonwealth and a proud ambassador.

The crew of Royal Yachtsmen were volunteers from the general service of the Royal Navy. Officers were appointed for up to two years, while the "yachtsmen" were drafted as volunteers and after 365 days' service could be admitted to "The Permanent Royal Yacht Service" as Royal Yachtsmen and served until they chose to leave the Royal Yacht Service or were dismissed for medical or disciplinary reasons. As a result, some served for 20 years or more. The ship also carried a platoon of Royal Marines when members of the Royal Family were on board.

The Royal Yacht's last foreign mission was to convey the last governor of Hong Kong, Chris Patten and the Prince of Wales away from Hong Kong after its handover to the People's Republic of China on 1 July 1997. Britannia was decommissioned on 11 December 1997.

Royal Armouries: Adrian and I attended a meeting at the Armouries on the 30th January 2014 to discuss the location of the WW1 & 2 panels and the lack of information available to visitors in directing them to the panels.

Very nearly all the people we were associated with both prior to and at the hand-over in November 2010 now seem to have left the employment of the Armouries. We discussed the history of our association with the Armouries and left documentation relating to previous meetings where we had been promised video display material around the two panels.

The conclusion of the meeting was that the new team would take away our concerns and look at the possibility of using, and displaying, the video footage we collected over the built-time of the panels. They also promised to look at our suggestion that a pull-out banner - similar to the WRWA pull-out banner we purchased some time ago - be displayed at the bottom of the steps and the lift entrance directing visitors to the panels on the third floor.

We can now only wait their response but at least they did appear interested and sympathetic to our concerns. Time will tell!

Our communications with the National Memorial Arboretum seem to have dried up at the moment but seeing that funding has knocked back the build programme until at least August 2014 this is probably not surprising.

We did, incidentally, advise the Armouries' personnel that others, including the National War Museum and the National Memorial Arboretum, had shown an interest in displaying the panels.
