Shepley meeting Saturday March 12th - full day session. Peter Berry - Caricature Carver

Once again we have invited back to our club the very popular Peter Berry, who will lead a full day workshop of caricature carving. This one will be entitled Fred No2 - or whatever you wish to call it.

It absolutely amazed me when I looked back over the records that it was in November 2011 that Peter came to our club and we all finished up with a Fred No1. Where does the time go to? Peter did come back again more recently, in November 2012, when we all carved a caricature face.

This is planned as a full day event. A pea and pie lunch and sweet will be served by the ladies. A fee of $\pounds 5$, as usual for the full day events, will be charged at the door to cover Peter's costs plus the Jelutong carving timber and your lunch.

Peter is going to set up at the front of the room with a camera on his work area and, as he goes through the stages of carving Fred 2 members will be encouraged to follow his progress, on the screen, with

their cut-out block of timber. Peter is going to provide each carver with a band-sawn blank of Jelutong. This blank will have an inch or so stub at the bottom that can be held in a workmate, or better still, in one of the small swivel carving clamps if you have one. Talking to Peter the other day, he said that the tools required are ideally the Flexcut type chisels, or smaller gouges, and a knife would also be handy. His intention is to go as slowly as necessary, but will encourage the more experienced carvers to add their own embellishments into the carving. I understand that the cut-out will have an arm stuck in his pocket and I'm not sure what the other one is doing. I think holding a stick. So at the end of the day, everybody should walk away with a finished carving - we hope! Or maybe, as last time, we can encourage Peter to come along to our evening carving classes to finish the project.

We shall try and cover the whole floor with some large dust sheets to make it easier for clearing up and everybody is encouraged to bring along his or her Workmate. If any carvers don't have a Workmate would they please give me a ring as I seem to have two old and scruffy ones spare. I also seem to have adopted a family of mice in the workshop if anybody wants one of those as well.
